### DID YOU KNOW?

On setting out on the voyage of the HMS Beagle, in 1831, Darwin's interests seems to have been primarily in Geology. In Chile he witnessed an earthquake that was accompanied by evident changes in the elevation of the land. He found fossils of sea life in the high Andes. His observations of the growth of coral in the southern Pacific led him to recognise that the entire bed of the Ocean must be subject to significant change.

Later during the voyage Darwin's interest seems to have become more focussed on the species of birds and animals he encountered. His five years of observation and adventure left him with much scope for speculation on the subject of the diversity, change, and relationship of species. His thoughts began to increasingly challenge the assumption of the immutability of species.

### DID YOU KNOW?

Charles Darwin wrote:

"It is not the strongest of the species that survives, nor the most intelligent that survives. It is the one that is the most adaptable to change.

" We can allow satellites, planets, suns, universe, nay whole systems of universes, to be governed by laws, but the smallest insect, we wish to be created at once by special act."

"On the ordinary view of each species having been independently created, we gain no scientific explanation."

### DID YOU KNOW?

Charles Darwin was only twenty-two years old when the HMS Beagle left Devonport harbour on 27th December 1831.

During the subsequent five-year long expedition the Beagle visited amongst other places the Cape Verde Islands (where there was a volcano), Brazil, Argentina and Chile (where there was an earthquake). In the Galápagos Islands, off the coast of Ecuador, Darwin observed that each island supported its own form of tortoise, mockingbird, and finch; the various forms were closely related but differed in structure and eating habits from island to island. Both observations raised the question of possible links between distinct but similar species.
